

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Overview 2018-2019



Fiscal year 2018-2019 marked the third year that I was fortunate enough to serve the Florissant Valley campus of St. Louis Community College, and just like my first two years, it was filled with exciting new opportunities for our students, hard work from our faculty and staff, and many changes as we work to continue our journey of fulfilling the initiatives found within our College's strategic plan. In the year prior, we worked to "tell our stories" and created a comprehensive annual report to share with our community and our colleagues. To keep this momentum going, we again decided to create an annual report to share highlights, events, and stories that we want to be sure are memorialized, so as not to forget a great idea, a significant accomplishment, or a compelling student journey. You will see each of these elements throughout the annual report, but some of our important highlights over the last year include the following:

- We again sponsored the Greater North County Chamber of Commerce luncheon in April, where we were able to share information about the College and the campus with over 100 high school students, K-12 partners, and business leaders. This year, we also partnered with the St. Louis Community College Foundation to provide an additional scholarship to each of the GNCC scholarship recipients to encourage these bright minds to consider Florissant Valley first.
- We were fortunate to be asked to host the 24:1 Clergy Coalition February meeting, where we presented information about the campus, the College, and our Workforce Solution Group programs. The attendees also heard from some of our Normandy dual enrollment students about the impact the campus has had on their educational aspirations. This year, four of the students from Normandy became the first FV dual enrollment students to earn their associate degree on the same day as their high school diploma through our Gateway to College program.
- We awarded the Dr. Rance Thomas Excellence in Community Partnership Award to the Ritenour School District. Dr. Chris Kilbride, Superintendent, accepted the award on behalf of the district, which has worked to find ways to increase its students' participation in an early college academy, the Emerson STEM Academy, dual credit, and dual enrollment. They will have their first associate degree graduates in 2021.
- Campus faculty and staff were visible in the community throughout the year through the College's STLCC Everywhere initiative, including the Fiesta in Florissant and the opening of the Ferguson-Florissant School District's new STEAM Academy high school. The STEAM students were able to learn about our programs, complete hands-on activities with our faculty, and get general information about applying to and paying for College.


- We encouraged the community to visit us with our first "Meet the Campus Day," hosted by our Marketing and Communications Coordinator, and our "Preview Day," which was a campus-wide event that brought nearly 150 people to Florissant Valley in April. These large-scale events were in addition to the multiple enrollment events held throughout the year, both during the week and on Saturdays.
- We served as a community advocate by supporting local organizations like Area Resources for Community and Human Services; Better Family Life; the Christian Hospital Foundation; Community Action Agency of St. Louis, Inc.; Educators for Social Justice; North County Inc.; The SoulFisher Ministries; and all of our local school districts. We do so by providing access to facilities, serving as speakers on panels, and supporting events.

All of this great work is in addition to the events that we host year-round for our students, faculty, and staff to give them opportunities for additional development, to celebrate their achievements, or to provide a premier student experience. From Welcome Week to Commencement and everything in between, the faculty and staff of Florissant Valley go out of their way to **expand minds** and **change lives**. After all, that's what we do.

Though we couldn't share all of our events or successes, we have compiled several here for you. We thank you for taking the time to read this report and for continuing your support of our exceptional College and campus.

2018-2019 Highlights

ACADEMIC ADVISING

• Collaborated with admissions and enrollment services, and the assessment center to create and implement the "Got Classes?" event, which was designed to increase the number of continuing students who registered for summer and/or fall classes.

ACADEMIC SUPPORT CENTER

The Academic Support Center, which includes supplemental instruction, the Math & Science Learning Center, peer tutoring and the Writing Center & Speaking Lab:


- Served at least 1,125 individual students in the 2018-2019 academic year, with more than 9,000 visits for tutoring services. Several hundred additional tutoring sessions were held in satellite service areas, which include anatomy & physiology tutoring, tutoring for deaf students, and students in deaf communications studies.
- **Sponsored 12 workshops and events throughout the academic year.** These included "Verse Your Valentine in the Writing Center," with 59 students participating, and the "Long Night Against Procrastination," attended by more than 70 students. In a post-event evaluation of the latter, students reported that they found the "Long Night Against Procrastination" both fun and educational. Of those responding,
 - 97% "Strongly Agreed" or "Agreed" that "I was able to identify the steps necessary to complete the assignment I came to work on at this event."
 - 94% "Strongly Agreed" or "Agreed" that "They met their completion goal for the event."
- Students responding to anonymous surveys about their overall experiences in the Academic Support Center were similarly positive:
 - More than 94% rated the "quality of tutoring I received from my tutor/Supplemental Instruction leader" as "Excellent" 70.79% or "Good" 23.59%.
 - More than 86% reported feeling "comfortable seeking help from the Academic Support Center,"
 - Nearly 82% reported that their "knowledge of the subject area improved due to tutoring and/or Supplemental Instruction.
 - 81% reported improved study and/or academic skills as a result of attending tutoring sessions.
 - 82% reported feeling more confident in their abilities as a result of tutoring.
 - Nearly 81% answered "Yes" when asked "Are you able to complete more problems independently as a result of attending tutoring?"
 - 63.5% reported achieving an improved grade after participating in tutoring.
- **Received Level 1, Stage 2 certification for the peer tutoring program**, from the College Reading and Language Association, after documenting that the tutor training program is rigorous and meets professional requirements and standards. In addition, seven peer tutors achieved CRLA

Level 1, Stage 2 tutor certification. Requirements for certification include completing a 10 hour CRLA certified training program and tutoring a minimum of 25 hours. The certified peer tutors are:

ACCESS OFFICE AND DEAF SERVICES

- Celebrated the accomplishments of students and staff:
 - 85% of students are in good standing.
 - 89% of students who engaged with the access office registered for courses.
 - 19 students graduated.
 - Two students are Emerging Scholars and three are Student Government Association leaders.
- **Collaborated with Special School District** to spearhead the third annual SSD College Day. These continued efforts have resulted in an increase in referrals from area high schools over the last year. Teacher training on transition efforts continues and all projects are being coordinated districtwide.
- **Combatted stigma and attitudinal barriers with meaningful events.** Hosted three social gatherings throughout the year including the annual graduation party held in conjunction with SAP and TRIO. Sponsored Common Hour speaker Tiffany Eickhoff.
 - Led the 39th Annual "Silent Weekend" through Continuing Education. Participants included three student volunteers, six staff volunteers and five faculty and/or adjunct volunteers. Deaf students take on leadership roles in this activity.
 - Engaged with the deaf communication studies and nursing faculty for the "Third Annual Deaf Patient Simulation Activity." Deaf students acted as patients for nursing and interpreting practicum students. This event won the STLCC and STLCC-Florissant Valley 2019 Innovation of the Year Award.

• Connected with our community

- Supported the "Deaf Visual Arts Festival" with three staff and two student volunteers to assist more than 800 community members who attended.
- Collaborated with the Special School District's Community Based Vocational Instruction Program for the first full year. Secured campus work sites including campus life, the fitness center, deaf communications, and the nursing department.
- Traveled to Gallaudet University and participated in "Unity Fest," an international festival.
 We met the president of Gallaudet.



• Streamlined technology services. Worked with the District to secure Scott Armstead, the College's first coordinator of assistive technology. Services to students are now equalized among the campuses including the sharing of technology such as digital recorders and talking calculators.

ADMISSIONS AND ENROLLMENT SERVICES

- Spearheaded information sessions on selected Tuesday evenings targeting prospective students and promoting STLCC's academic and workforce programs.
- Established an AES processing center that is a separate work space dedicated to processing, operations and behind-the-scenes enrollment functions. Separating this work space now allows admissions and enrollment services staff to engage more fully with students and provide a higher level of customer service.
- **Conducted a tour of the Florissant Valley campus** for 55 sixth-graders and four chaperones from Confluence Academy-South City. Besides the tour, the group enjoyed interactive engagement with several of our programs including: art, music, engineering and the <u>radio</u> <u>station</u>.

- Improved outreach and recruitment efforts by combining efforts of District Process Improvement Manager Donte' Harris and the AES team through the use of the Tableau, a software system that provides a means to collect and analyze enrollment data for use in enrollment management planning.
- Partnered with the St. Louis County Library's Career Online High School's first and second graduation ceremonies held at the library's headquarters. Chris Fletcher, AES manager, represented the College. Fletcher surprised the graduates with 3-credit hour scholarships to STLCC.

ASSESSMENT CENTER

• **Developed and implemented a successful Transfer Fair** on Wednesday, Feb. 20. Ninety-eight students attended, and 24 colleges and universities participated.

BIOTECHNOLOGY

- Awarded \$373,371 of direct funding from the National Science Foundation for the grant "Expanding the Bio-Bench" developed by Dr. Richard Norris, director, and Elizabeth "Betsy" Boedeker, senior research scientist, CRO coordinator, at the Center for Plant and Life Sciences. The grant will fund the development of two new courses in "targeted whole genome editing" that will be added to the Biotechnology Associate in Applied Science degree program.
- Hosted the first all-black female high school cohort for STLCC's life science laboratory assistant program at Bio-Research, Development and Growth Park, which is on the campus of the Donald Danforth Plant Science Center. The LSLA program serves as a pathway for students to earn a Biotechnology AAS degree. Upon completion of this program, these young women will earn their LSLA certificate of specialization by the time they graduate from high school or shortly after. This program provides the necessary skill set to work at entry-level laboratory positions in the biotechnology field.

CAMPUS LIFE

- Recognized students for leadership, academic achievement, scholastic scholarship, civic engagement, service learning and more at the Student Government Association Award Banquet. Approximately 300 students, faculty and staff attended the event. Fox 2 reporter Derrion Henderson served as the master of ceremonies. The family of Dr. Joe Worth presented the scholarship bearing his name to the recipient, Maia Clark. Other awards included:

- **Developed a leadership program for STLCC-Florissant Valley student leaders.** Twenty student leaders participated in the leadership retreat held at Lake Williamson in Carlinville, Ill. The

retreat was facilitated by Keith Ware, adjunct faculty, history. The retreat helped students strengthen their leadership skills, make connections with other leaders from various clubs and collaborate on program ideas for the upcoming academic year.

• Honored Toni Stovall, vice president, SGA, who was selected as a Journey to College Student Ambassador for the Missouri Department of Higher Education. She will represent STLCC, other college students in Missouri and appear in publications, videos, websites and/or social media pages that help students prepare for college.

CAREER DEVELOPMENT

- Implemented a new Career Readiness Series featuring workshops for students focusing on such topics as professionalism, teamwork, use of technology and career management.
- Hosted successful Career Fairs in the student center during the fall and spring semesters. There were approximately 65 employers and 170 students at each of the fairs.

CHILD AND FAMILY DEVELOPMENT DISTRICT PROGRAM

- Began its first year of implementation as a District program in January.
- Planned and held its first productive Child and Family Development Advisory Board Meeting in May. The meeting was attend by more than 15 professionals and business owners in the field.
- Welcomed three new full-time faculty members: Amy Freshwater, Carol Nixon and Jasmin Marshall. The new faculty have been very busy working on curriculum. They aligned learning objectives with new course objectives CFD 104, CFD 108, CFD 202 and collaboration with faculty on course content for a new course CFD 105.
- Sent 12 STLCC employees and students to Finland from May 18-26 to study the country's early childhood educational system. They are: Child Development Laboratory Center staff Anna-Marie Mann, program specialist; Renee Mayse, manager, Child Development Center; and Seena Phillips, child and family development specialist II; CFD faculty Amy Freshwater, assistant professor, child and family development; Jasmin Marshall, assistant professor, child and family development; CFD student Heidi Gordon and Janice Nesser-Chu, dean, liberal arts.

CHILD DEVELOPMENT LABORATORY CENTER

- Held professional development at the center Thursday, Aug. 9–Friday Aug. 10. Kim Mueller, learning development specialist, and the Employee Assistance Program gave presentations on "True Colors" and "Respectful Interactions." The center is staffed with knowledgeable and skilled early childhood professionals and these trainings were a nice addition to our toolboxes for working with students, parents and coworkers.
- **Opened the CDLC Rocket Room's Bow Chicka Meow Pet Clinic** Monday, Sept. 10, with an official ribbon-cutting. The children have been very busy taking their animals in for care,

volunteering at or working in the clinic. Did you know that clinics need receptionists, secretaries, accountants, housekeepers, lab techs, vet techs, veterinarians, and community volunteers with many responsibilities to be sure that the animals are well taken care of? It is quite an operation in the Rocket Room!

- Used the Perkins' grant to help Anna-Marie Mann, program specialist, attend the Parents as Teachers International Conference in Arizona. Mann learned about resources for supporting parents who have special needs. She also participated in a session focused on supporting diversity.
- Provided its annual Professional Development Day Wednesday, Nov. 21. Topics for the day included: "Bull Dogs and Mother Hens, Team Building in Early Childhood Programs," "When are We Going to Grow Up?" "Navigating Adult Relationships," "First Aid" and "CPR" training.
- **Replaced flooring courtesy of capital funding.** The project began in November and was completed in January.

COMMUNICATIONS

- Garnered honors via Eric Driskill, professor, deaf communications, and Michelle Petterchak, assistant professor, nursing. The duo won the Innovator of the Year Award for the Florissant Valley campus and districtwide. Their winning project was a collaboration between deaf communications and nursing. The project involved deaf volunteers who became "patients," so nursing students could practice the skills they learned and DCS students could interpret between them.
- Spearheaded the Deaf Visual Arts Festival April 27, which was a collaboration between deaf communication studies and Deaf Inc. The event brought over 800 people to the campus to see more than 25 locally and nationally known artists who are deaf and/or performing artists. Eric Driskill, associate professor, deaf communications, chaired the event, which ran from 10 a.m.-5 p.m. and was free and open to the public. Local, regional and national sponsors included: Convo, the Greater St. Louis Association of the Deaf, the Missouri Arts Council, the Missouri Association of the Deaf, the Missouri Commission for the Deaf and Hard of Hearing, the Regional Arts Commission, the Rochester Institute of Technology, Sorenson Communications, and St. Louis Community College. St. Louis Community College received recognition from deaf communities across the nation.
- Held a Fall Speaker Series as part of the mass communications program, which featured:
 - Anthony Kiekow, executive director of communications, Riverview Gardens School District, and former TV journalist, spoke at STLCC-Florissant Valley Thursday, Oct. 25.
 Kiekow gave students a brief overview of his academic and professional career, which began at a community college before he transferred to the University of Minnesota.
 - Don Corrigan, author, Webster University professor, media law, global and environmental journalism, and Times Inc. editor-in-chief, spoke Thursday, Nov. 8.
 Corrigan discussed his experiences in the media world and shared his thoughts on how to build a successful media career.

- Gave top speakers from communications classes a chance to show off their speeches at the Communications Students Speakers Showcase held Tuesday, April 30.
- Hosted annual Media Portfolio Day Friday, May 3. Graduating mass communications students Kevin Hefley and Kaleb Kellher presented their digital portfolios to a panel of local industry professionals and professors from colleges in the area. The portfolios showcased the skills students gained in the program.

ENGLISH AND READING

- Continued work towards a developmental education redesign.
- Carol Hake, associate professor, English, was selected as the 43rd David L. Underwood Memorial Lecture honoree. Her lecture "Work in Progress: A Palimpsest" was well attended by faculty, staff, students and alumni. Paul Higdon, professor, music, and Sarah Fielding, associate professor, English, reading, performed at the event.
- Honored Carlos Blanco, professor, reading who received the John and Suanne Roueche Excellence Award.
- Lauded Kim Pepples, adjunct faculty, English, who received the Adjunct Faculty of the Year Award.
- **Sponsored several opportunities for students,** including a writing competition, the student literary magazine and several poetry readings.

FINANCIAL AID

- **Distributed more than 100 "Access Granted" drawstring bags in August** to welcome students and provide them with helpful financial aid and STLCC information.
- **Conducted a "Scholarship Blueprint Seminar" for students** in September. Representatives from Saint Louis University and Webster University were on hand to provide information on the college transfer process.
- Participated in African American History Month Celebration. Shawn Harrell, financial aid campus manager, presented the "African American Higher Education Experience" in the Student Center. The presentation highlighted the historical struggles, sacrifices and contributions by African Americans in attaining educational achievement.

FLORISSANT VALLEY GALLERIES

• Hosted the "26th Annual High School Art Exhibit" Jan. 28-Feb. 14 in the Contemporary Art Gallery. The following schools participated: Collegiate School of Medicine and Bioscience, De Smet Jesuit, East Saint Louis Senior, Edwardsville, Francis Howell Central, Hazelwood Central, Hazelwood West, Incarnate Word, Kirkwood, Lutheran North, McCluer North, Metro Academic and Classical, Parkway South, Pattonville, Ritenour and Timberland. The reception included an art department open house and awards ceremony. This event is a major recruiting event for the art programs.

- **Displayed the "2019 Annual Art Department Student Exhibit"** in the Contemporary Art Gallery and Humanities building. First-year work was on view in the Humanities building and advanced student work was shown in the gallery. The exhibit ran April 29-May 9. The reception on Thursday, May 9, also featured the "Sixth Annual Animation Showcase," which highlighted the year's best work in animation, storyboarding and motion graphics.
- Exhibited: Aug. 20-Sept. 20 Michael Dixon, "Can You Hear Me, Now?;" Oct. 1-Nov. 1 "Monica Mason;" Nov. 5-Dec. 6 – Seth Bland, Quinn Briceño, Shabez Jamal, Sam Kennedy, Lee Kratzer, George Lum, Chelsea McDaniel, Genesis Pizarro and Brock Seals, "Alumni Invitational;" Feb. 25-April 4 – "Damia Smith."
- Beautified the Administration building with art exhibited art in Gallery ADMIN. In addition to offering gallery exhibitions in the Contemporary Art Gallery, the walls on the second floor of the Administration building provide an exhibit place for emerging and minority artists. These exhibits tend to run longer and provide an opportunity for artists that may not have the breadth of work required for a gallery show. Gallery ADMIN shows included: "Accumulations," Curtis Bozif; "The Things We Carry and Other Obsessions," Ann Miller; and "A Solo Exhibition," Page Holzenbauer.

KCFV-RADIO STATION

- Took its collaborative show on the road to help out at the "World Beats and World Eats: Africa Program" at the St. Louis Community College at Forest Park campus Thursday, Oct. 25. The event was organized by Jeanne Florini, professor, nutrition, hospitality studies, and Layla Goushey, professor, English. KCFV provided music selections that Florissant Valley students enjoyed this past spring. The station also provided some giveaway items, and did a few "call in remotes" from Forest Park. KCFV hopes to expand the program to include the Meramec and Wildwood campuses in the future. Mass communications students also attended the event.
- Named Alexander Ray the recipient of the 2018 Phillip H. Grogg Award that recognizes the outstanding broadcast student at Florissant Valley. Ray received the "KCFV Golden Microphone" trophy and a \$500 scholarship. The two runner ups, Deanna Donovan and Venetra Raff-Covington, received a plaque and a \$100 scholarship. The Phillip H. Grogg Scholarship established in 1983 by former STLCC-Florissant Valley President David Harris was the first, and remains the only scholarship award in the District named after a student.
- **Put equipment in place to reliably broadcast from other campuses** for events including Archers' games and campus celebrations.
- Produced and distributed podcast and broadcast packages spotlighting happenings on the FV campus, with an eye toward including items of interest on all STLCC campuses. KCFV is looking to have an even greater presence in the community in the near future. The goal is to raise our visibility at community events, and build awareness of STLCC programs and services.

LIBERAL ARTS DIVISION

The liberal arts division houses four departments with three transfer programs, seven CTE programs, 15 disciplines and four Student Learning Laboratories. The division played an important role in supporting Strategic Initiative 5: Promoting accountability, excellence, innovation, continuous improvement, and diversity and inclusion. Special thanks to all the faculty and staff who served on the planning group and subcommittee for SI5, please see their names and other details in the 2017-2018 Florissant Valley Campus Annual Report. During the course of the fiscal year, the division accomplished the following:

- Fostered an atmosphere in keeping with SI5 by implementing tools to engage faculty and staff. It produced a biweekly e-newsletter that focused on College, campus, department and program events. It also highlighted faculty, staff, student and alumni accomplishments and/or opportunities for campus and community engagement. The e-news is a great source of keeping the line of communication open in the division, engaging faculty in dialogue and opportunities. Full-time and adjunct faculty and staff contribute to its contents.
- Held biweekly chairs and/or managers meetings; twice a semester all staff and/or faculty division meetings; once a semester program coordinator and/or lead faculty meetings; and three times a year secretarial/support staff meetings. Additionally, campus social events and gatherings were held twice a year.
- Approved for the Department of Education Child Care Access Means Parents in School Program grant for the second year in a row. This means the program has funding for the next three years at \$269,147 per year. The CCAMPIS program targets low-income, Pell Grant-eligible STLCC students who are parents by providing financial support for their child care needs. CCAMPIS promotes increased parent support services via parent and/or child learning events and resource materials, and it promotes professional development for child care services staff. This grant is administered by Janice Nesser-Chu, dean of liberal arts, and Selena Washington, project associate II.
- Helped plan and coordinate the campus Women's History Month Celebration. Annie Wagganer was the coordinator. The month included 12 events and a keynote address. This year's keynote speaker was Dr. Mary Schmidt Campbell. Dr. Campbell is the president of Spelman College, a leading college for women of African descent. Before coming to Spelman, she served for more than two decades as dean of New York University's Tisch School of the Arts. An art historian and former curator, Dr. Campbell began her career in New York as executive director of the Studio Museum in Harlem, the country's first accredited Black Fine Arts Museum and a linchpin in Harlem's redevelopment. Dean Nesser-Chu was instrumental in bringing Dr. Campbell to campus.
- Developed an amazing service learning day for more than 30 phenomenal middle school students from the Ferguson-Florissant School District. The students who were chosen to experience college for a day were identified as homeless according to the federal McKinney-Vento Act. They were outstanding young learners who joined classes in oral communication, chemistry, theatre, TV, radio and introduction to sociology. LaRhonda Wilson, associate professor of sociology and anthropology, organized this event. Other participants included Fran

Hooker, manager, academic support services; Paul Huddleston, supervisor campus radio; Dan Betzler, professor, deaf communications; Amy Brown-Marshall, assistant professor, communications; Steve Bai, assistant professor, mass communications; and student leaders from the Human Services Club. The Human Services Club collected and donated household supplies for the families and delivered them to the school district. Additionally, they hosted a panel and provided a campus tour for the students and Yolanda Rodgers-Garvin, students in transition homeless and foster care liaison, and other FFSD personnel who accompanied students. The day was capped with a restorative circle led by an amazing community leader, Farrakhan Shegog, founder of Young Voices with Action Inc., and staff member of the Urban League of Metropolitan St. Louis' Save Our Sons Program.

LIBRARY

- Visited by more than 84,900 people who checked out books, used computers and other offerings; for example, the Writing Center and supplemental instruction.
- Checked out more than 13,000 items. Included in this number were more than 2,800 laptop checkouts.
- Faculty facilitated 62 classroom visits and discussions from various departments such as sociology, English, communications, human services and Smart Start.

MARKETING AND COMMUNICATIONS

This office exists to help students, staff and faculty tell the unique St. Louis Community College at Florissant Valley story. A few marketing and communications highlights include the following:

- Secured media coverage of the STLCC-Florissant Valley campus.
 - Welcomed Rachel Sudduth, digital content producer for KMOV, to STLCC-Florissant Valley's "Meet the Campus Day" Oct. 3. During the event, Sudduth met with Dr. Elizabeth Perkins, president, and received an overview of the campus. Sudduth toured the yard, stayed for lunch and ended the day interviewing employers who were on site for the Career and Networking Fair being hosted simultaneously by STLCC's career and employment services office. She also interviewed STLCC-Florissant Valley students and staff. Sudduth left with a list of possible story ideas shared by Shantana Stewart, marketing and communications coordinator and chair of the event. Sudduth published the article "'Meet the Campus' Day invites students, media to explore STLCC Florissant Valley" as a result of her time on campus.
 - Earned "rock star" status July 2018 for securing STLCC-Florissant Valley multiple media spots associated with the Child Development Laboratory Center's "Week of the Young Child Celebration," including newspaper, radio, television and internet stories. Stewart was honored again in February 2019 for drawing the media's attention to FV's Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. event.
- **Drafted the Florissant Valley Campus 2017-2018 Annual Report.** The 68-page report was presented to the Board of Trustees, other District leaders and distributed to community partners.

- Served as co-chair of the Strategic Initiative 3, Recruitment and Outreach committee. In this role, Stewart shepherded the group by helping it develop its goals for the year, booked meeting spaces, developed agendas, led the canvassing effort and contributed to the success of Preview Day and the Speakers' Bureau. The group met five times during the fiscal year. The SI3, Recruitment and Outreach committee agreed to canvass communities, develop a Preview Day to showcase the campus and establish a Speakers' Bureau.
- Targeted people who visit campus with a sandwich board advertising campaign. From prospective students who intentionally visit campus to sign up for classes to community members who simply visit to exercise guests can't help but notice the sandwich boards strategically positioned at the Student Center, track and other key locations on the yard. The Academic Support Center and Campus Police liked the idea so much they also purchased sandwich boards to advertise their offerings. The MAC sandwich boards on campus mirror the advertising STLCC-Florissant Valley displays monthly on North County Incorporated's digital billboards found along Interstate 270 and McDonnell Boulevard facing west. Stewart also used an existing FV campus sign as a billboard. She developed a temporary billboard by covering a portion of Florissant Valley's campus sign that faces I-270 to market Florissant Valley's April 6 Preview Day. After this event ended, she developed a different temporary billboard to market the push for fall enrollment.

- Annie Wagganer, assistant professor of sociology and coordinator of the honors program, was named the 2019 Cross Papers Fellow by the League for Innovation in the Community College. As the winner, she received a \$2,000 stipend to support research and writing of the 2019 edition of the Cross Papers. In February, she presented the Cross Papers, No. 22 on the topic, "Developing Expert Learners: Addressing Faculty, Student and Societal Bias" at the League of Innovations Conference in New York City. Traditionally, the Cross Papers are used as a guide for faculty and staff to reach diverse groups of students who attend community colleges.
- The sociology program collaborated with the League of Women Voters to present an Issues Forum Saturday, Oct. 27, to help people become more informed voters. This event was open to the campus and public.

- Dr. Howard Rosenthal presented "Suicide Prevention: A Crash Course in Emotional Life-Saving" as a part of the Center for Teaching and Learning Faculty Lecture Series.
- LaRhonda Wilson, associate professor, sociology, anthropology, and Wesley Bell, associate professor of criminal justice, participated in National Voter Registration Day at Harris-Stowe State University Tuesday, Sept. 25. The event included clinics, workshops and registration. Bell gave the opening remarks. The theatre program also promoted its upcoming production "Exonerated" directed by Dan Betzler, professor, deaf communications.
- The social science department hosted an annual film series and discussion every Friday in October.

SCIENCE TECHNOLOGY ENGINEERING MATHEMATICS BUSINESS DIVISION

- Organized and conducted numerous tours of the engineering department's technology laboratories for schools, prospective students and industry partners. This department draws interest due to its cutting-edge programs in engineering science, precision machining and engineering technology.
- Hosted the FIRST Robotics competitors from around the region, as well as the Tests of Engineering Aptitude, Mathematics and Science competition for the St. Louis area. These high school robotics competitions brought student representatives from nearly every high school in the St. Louis region and beyond to Florissant Valley.
- Held numerous contests and student activities for the campus. Several math contests were organized and hosted by the math department. The accounting faculty introduced students to the Missouri Society of CPAs, and obtained students paid internships for tax preparation companies. Science faculty contributed as judges at area science fairs. Health and wellness department faculty contributed their expertise for activities conducted by the Florissant Valley Wellness Committee.
- Initiated renovation of the space that will house Emerson STEM Academy dual credit participants. This renovation, made possible by a grant from the Emerson Corporation, will support student learning in the areas of science, technology, engineering, and math and increase participation and success for north St. Louis County students. The Florissant Valley campus will play an important role in increasing STEM career development for area students.

STUDENT AFFAIRS

- **Responded to the community by offering assistance and hope** to displaced Vatterott College students. Several staff from admissions and enrollment services, academic advising and financial aid, manned the STLCC Mobile Unit stationed near the closed college and provided information and alternatives to students for completing their education.
- Claimed bragging rights for the achievements of Rosita Lewis, director of TRIO, who was awarded the STLCC-Florissant Valley Adria Award. The Adria Award recognizes a woman who exemplifies dynamic service.

- Merged the career development department with academic advising in an effort to optimize the student experience and enable students to receive information, guidance and support in the area of career exploration early in their educational journey. Additionally, students had the opportunity to utilize a new tool, Focus 2, which provides self-assessment and information on various career options.
- Honored the dedication and many years of service provided to STLCC and its students by Gwen Nixon, manager of campus life, and Rosita Lewis, director of TRIO, who both retired in July.

STUDENT ASSISTANCE PROGRAM

- Provided more than 1,100 individual meals to students experiencing food insecurity.
- **Sponsored domestic violence and sexual assault awareness programming** in collaboration with the access services, counseling, campus life, TRIO, the sociology department and others.

TERRY M. FISCHER THEATRE

- Attendance rose by 36% over last season.
- **Presented five theatrical productions** including "The Exonerated," "Twelfth Night," "A Street Car Named Desire," "The Glass Menagerie" and "An Evening of One Acts."
- Held two post-show events in partnership with the sociology department after "The Exonerated," performances, which were produced by the theatre. The events included a Q&A with the sociology department and the cast, as well as a panel discussion that included an exonerated inmate, a lawyer, legal scholar and other social justice reformers.
- Hosted 40 campus and community-based events along with technical and staging support for the: Chancellor's Forum, DCS Pinning, Deaf Visual Arts Festival, Districtwide FY20 Draft Budget Presentation, Gateway to College Graduation Ceremony, Grogg Award Ceremony, Liberal Arts Division Meeting, Martin Luther King Day Celebration, Medical Marijuana Forum, Music Department Concerts, Nurses Rehearsal and Pinning Ceremony, Orchestra Performances, PTK Induction, "Rent" performance, Staff Development Day, Suicide Prevention Lecture, Underwood Lecture, Women's History Month keynote address, "World Beats and Eats" and more.
- Renovated the roof and made other necessary improvements.



• Hosted the World Climate Simulation role-playing exercise of the U.N. climate change negotiations in October. Student participants gained climate change awareness and were able to find out how their proposed policies would impact the global climate system in real time using the interactive C-ROADS computer simulation. Participants earned a certificate of participation from the University of Massachusetts Amherst.

• Twenty student participants of the STLCC-Florissant Valley TRIO program graduated and transferred to four-year institutions.

VISUAL AND PERFORMING ARTS

- Held its 23rd Annual Portfolio Day Monday, Oct. 29. It is a great opportunity for second-year students to learn about transfer opportunities and collect feedback from institutions on their work. Portfolio Day is also an opportunity to see firsthand, the strong and exciting visual work being created at our National Association of Schools of Art and Design accredited institution by students in the general fine arts, graphic communications and photography programs. Last year, 80% of students were accepted for admission and several were offered scholarships. This year, there were more than 19 representatives from prestigious art and design schools, colleges and universities who reviewed students' portfolios and gave presentations about their institutions. The schools included: The School of the Art Institute of Chicago, Columbia College Chicago, Maryland Institute College of Art, Washington University in St. Louis, Pennsylvania Academy of Art and Design, Ringling School of Art & Design and San Francisco Art Institute.
- Presented information about Florissant Valley's three art programs to local high school art classes. These visits gave potential students an opportunity to meet art faculty and learn about the College's outstanding art programs. The visits usually took place on Fridays. There were approximately six recruitment visits in the fall and 11 visits in the spring.
- Took students from the general fine arts, photography and graphic communication programs on a whirlwind tour of Chicago in April. Students boarded the bus at 5:30 a.m. to spend the day visiting art museums, galleries, film and/or animation studios. In the morning, the students toured the campus of the Chicago Art Institute and visited the Museum of Contemporary Art. In the afternoon, the groups split up to explore downtown Chicago art galleries.
- Shared three STLCC-Florissant Valley Symphony Orchestra performances in the theatre for the campus and community to enjoy. The March concert benefited the St. Louis Warrior Support Foundation and raised hundreds of dollars on their behalf.
- Hosted annual ART IN Saturday, April 28. ART IN is a late-night session that provides students with an opportunity to catch up on studio work, participate in a variety of demonstrations and workshops, as well as enjoy a night of creating art. Approximately two students, 12 instructors and demo artists attended. Students engaged in figure drawing, shoe painting, metal pour demos, worked on projects, played video games and just hung out. The event, which at one time continued all night, lasted from 4 p.m. to midnight.


Stapleton gave a few tips as key advice before heading to a job fair, "Dress to impress, that's number one. Always have a good resume and make sure it's updated."

"Research the company you want to work for and first impression is everything," said Stapleton.

Students have the option to select professional clothing from the "Clothes Closet" at Florissant Valley before heading to the job fair or anytime they are heading to an interview off campus.

The clothes are donated by employers or other students, but they are previewed by employees at Florissant Valley to ensure they are high-quality, clean, and ironed.

We give them different information about job leads, some information before they meet with the employers, and things to expect, like greeting the employer," said Davis Moore, Manager of Career Development at Florissant Valley and Forest Park Campus.

Practice makes perfect according to Moore, "You learn more through practice so attending this event gives you a chance to see how things are ran and it gives you a chance to network."
